Refer to Article 37 and Appended Table 3 (a)-(c) of Paragraph 2, Article 37 of the Standards for Establishment of Universities, when filling in “Area of Land Required by the Standards for Establishment (m<sup>2</sup>)” and “Area of Buildings Required by the Standards for Establishment (m<sup>2</sup>).” The base date of the admission capacity shall be as of May 1, 2012. For a newly established undergraduate or graduate school, calculate the areas taking into consideration the step-by-step development in conformity with the 44th Public Notice of The Ministry of Education, Culture, Sports, Science and Technology issued on March 31, 2003.

2. Facilities that can be included in the calculation of the aggregated area of school buildings include lecture halls, seminar rooms, student study rooms, experiment and practicum rooms, laboratories, libraries (book storage, reading areas and offices), facilities related to administration (the President’s office, greeting rooms, office space including document storage, meeting rooms, reception areas, guardrooms, night-duty rooms and warehouses), student assembly houses, cafeterias, hallways, lavatories, etc.
3. An auditorium that is used as a lecture hall can be counted among “Lecture Halls, Seminar Rooms and Student Rooms.”
4. When the university has multiple campuses, create a table for every campus.
